PREFACE

It is extremely difficult for the foreigner to find at once the postgraduate or special medical work that he has come to Paris to pursue. He misses the centralisation that experience of other countries and schools has led him to expect. There is no central bureau of information, no publication wherein he can see at a glance and choose that which he seeks. At the Faculty of Medicine itself he finds but a multiplicity of notices and placards that serve only to increase his bewilderment. Changes are made almost annually in the personnel of the hospitals of Paris, and, perhaps for this reason, no official attempt is made, other than by means of announce-

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ments of such changes in the medical journals, to publish a handbook of more or less permanent value. Both in the winter and summer sessions, for example, courses are given by various men in their particular specialty and hospital. It is impossible, in such a small handbook as this, to take specific notice of such courses. But we may succeed in drawing the visitor's attention to them by pointing out the hour and day and hospital where such a specialist may be found. The visitor will then, upon the spot, easily inform himself of the special course that may happen to be in progress at the time of his visit.

My endeavour, in preparing this little handbook for the use of foreign physicians, has been to restrict myself to the information they usually require, while at the same time giving a fairly complete account of the details of scientific medical education in Paris.

Thus, under the name of each hospital I give its position in the city and the means of reaching it, the professors, physicians and surgeons, who have wards in it, and the days and hours of their visits and lectures. These details I recapitulate in a table in the form of a

diary, giving for each day of the week the lectures, operations or ward visits, and the hours at which they are held.

Lastly, I add some details in connection with museums and libraries, medical societies and their meetings, the practice of medicine in France, the Pasteur Institute, the Institute of France, etc. I also append a list of the English and American physicians who practice in Paris, and the addresses of some English trained nurses and nursing institutions.

Lord Lister, to whom I submitted the List of Contents, has honoured me with the few words of approval which, with his permission, I place as a Prefatory Letter. I desire again to thank him for his courtesy and kindness.

I must also acknowledge the help I have received from Paris Médical, the volume officially issued to members of the XIIIth International Medical Congress held in Paris in 1900, from the last edition (1900) of the Guide Médicale, published by Maloine, and from the Agenda Médical, issued by Asselin et Houzeau, from the Annuaire Civile et Militaire, and other directories.




Should this little volume enable some of my English and American confrères to make a more interesting and profitable sojourn in Paris than they otherwise might have, I shall be more than repaid for the time spent in the compilation of these details. It is a privilege to attempt to spread the name and fame of Paris, and to make known opportunities that are perhaps insufficiently appreciated.

P.S.—The Municipal Council of Paris has voted a sum of 3,000 francs to open an "Office of Medical Information," which will probably be situated at the Faculty of Medicine. The Faculty of Medicine has appointed a Committee to consider the project, and Professor Pozzi, its Secretary, has made a favourable report. He points out—in January, 1902—the necessity of such a bureau, the simplicity and economy of its organisation, and emphasizes the contrast that at present exists between the facilities offered to foreigners in Berlin and Vienna and the difficulty



they experience in Paris. This Bureau de renseignements médicaux will have the telephone, and some one will always be present to give information upon any points in connection with medical education and instruction in Paris. At the time of writing—March, 1903—this bureau does not yet exist.



THE FACULTY OF MEDICINE*

The Faculty of Medicine, formed by the Professors and the Assistant Professors, or Agrégés, has its meetings at No. 12, Rue de l'Ecole de Médecine. Professor Debove, the Dean, receives on Wednesdays, at 9; M. Grisez, the Secretary, on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, from midday to 1 o'clock, and from 2 to 3.

(c) THE PRACTICAL SCHOOL is situated opposite the building of the Faculty.

The Anatomy Department consists of eight rooms, each capable of accommodating ninety students. Here dissections are carried on, and operative surgery practised from October till June, the latter under the direction of Dr. Hartmann. Special practical courses are given. Thus in April and May, at 1.30 p.m. daily, there is a post-graduate course of operative surgery on the male genito-urinary tract. Anatomy is under the direction of Dr. Rieffel, assisted by eight demonstrators of anatomy appointed for a period of four years, and fifteen junior demonstrators or aides-d'anatomie.

In addition to the laboratories attached to the various hospitals, there are a number in connection with the Faculty for practical work and research, viz.:—Biology, Chemistry, Comparative Pathology, Physics, Pharmacology, Forensic Medicine, Therapeutics, Hygiene, Physiology, General Pathology and Therapeutics, Surgery, Histology, Pathological Anatomy, Anatomy, Operative Surgery, and Parasitology.

THE HOSPITALS

It will, of course, be possible to mention and describe only the more important of these institutions, the number of the smaller ones being legion, and presenting little of special interest to the foreigner, whose time is probably limited. It may also be added that important changes are imminent with regard to the Paris Hospitals. The Municipal Council of Paris and the Assist- . ance Publique are discussing the means of raising funds to reconstruct a number, notably La Pitié, Cochin, Ricord, Broca, Broussais, and the Enfants-Malades, and to pull down Laënnec, Andral, Bichat, Beaujon, La Charité, the Maison Municipale de Santé, Aubervilliers, and the annex of Hotel Dieu. Plans are also being considered for the construction of a hospital for contagious diseases at Ivry, and two new hospitals on the right bank of the Seine and one on the left. We may divide the hospitals into-(a) General Hospitals; (b) Special; and (c) those for Children.



a. GENERAL HOSPITALS

HOTEL DIEU (1, Place du Parvis-Notre-Dame)
Metropolitan Ry-Station Châtelet.

This is the oldest Hospital in Paris, having been founded in the 7th century by Bishop St. Landry. It has successively been called St. Christopher's Hospital, the Maison-Dieu, St. Mary's and, during the Revolution, the Hospital of Humanity. The present building was commenced in 1864 and completed in 1878.

It contains 800 beds.

This Hospital was constructed in 1612 on the site of a Royal tennis-ground. The date can still be seen on the ancient doorway of the hospital. At first it was intended by Louis XIV. to be a general hospital with a wing for prostitutes who had repented. In 1788 these women were sent to the "Maison de Sainte-Pélagie" and the children to the late Trousseau Hospital.

It now contains over 700 beds.

Not far from the Faculty of Medicine. 650 beds. Was founded by Henry IV. in 1602, at the request of Queen Mary de Médicis, who had four monks of the Order of St. Jean de Dieu sent from Italy. The monks of this Order were known as Brothers of Charity and were bound by their vows to practice medicine and surgery! Part of the first building of the hospital still stands. The first chair of clinical medicine in Paris was inaugurated here by Corvisart during the Revolution.

The history of the care taken by the State of foundlings is a long one from the year 1552 when Parliament ordered the Lords hauts-justiciers to contribute to their support, and the noble crusade of Saint Vincent de Paul in their favour in 1638. A decree of the year II. of the Revolution gave the title Enfants de la Patrie to these children.

In the present hospital such children may be received at any age from the day of their birth to their twelfth year. They are, according to their age, handed over to a wet-nurse, sent to the country or placed in the homes of

artisans and labourers.

There is also a department for the nutrition by sheasses of children with hereditary syphilis.

Up to the Revolution, all kinds of patients were admitted, pregnant women, wetnurses and their babes, male children up to five years of age, maniac, epileptics, blind and incurable. It is now a vast establishment and contains the clinical professorship of nervous diseases. There is also a training-school for nurses, for backward children, working-wards, etc. The outdoor consultation department is particularly instructive.

the Royal House of France.

The present building was erected in 1632 by order of Richelieu to receive wounded and invalid soldiers, and at the close of the 18th Century it was a home, a hospital

and a prison.

Since 1883 there has been a section reserved for idiot, epileptic and backward children, in which the methods of Edward Séguin are practised in order to develope as far as possible the elements of intelligence. Dr. Bourneville has charge of this important section.



In January 1871, during the Siege of Paris, Sir Richard Wallace opened, for the reception of the sick British poor shut up in Paris, two wards adjoining his hospital for the wounded. In October he determined to build a hospital for British poor in Paris, to be called the Hertford British Hospital in memory of the late Marquis of Hertford.

The present building was opened for patients in April 1879 and was inaugurated by a visit from Lord Lyons, then British Ambassador. In June 1879, Their Roya Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales and Princess Victoria visited the hospital. In June 1900 Lady Wallace made it over to the British Government by deed of covenant and the present Committee of Management was appointed. The Hon. Alan Herbert, M.D., who had been physician since its commencement, resigned about this time and a new staff was appointed.




The Academy of the Sciences and the Academy of Medicine, both form sections of the Institute.

The Academy of the Sciences holds its sessions upon each Monday at 3, and annually awards a number of prizes, which carry with them the title of Lauréat de l'Académie. Among the medical sections are general physics, chemistry, botany, anatomy, zoology, medicine, and surgery.

The members of the last sections are: Marey, Bouchard, Guyon, d'Arsonval, and Lannelongue.

The Academy of Medicine, created by Royal Charter in 1820, inaugurated its new premises at No. 16, rue Bonaparte, in November, 1902. It appoints committees upon matters concerning national hygiene, such as vaccination, epidemics, etc. It holds private sittings on Tuesdays at 3, and its annual public meeting in the first fortnight in December. The President for 1903 is Professor Lancereaux; the Permanent Secretary is Professor Jaccoud.





GENERAL INFORMATION.

THE PRACTICE OF MEDICINE IN FRANCE.

To practice medicine in French territory it is necessary to hold a French degree. By the Ministerial decree of July, 1896, foreign physicians who desire such a degree must, before commencing their medical studies in France, take the qualification in general education known as that of Bachelier de l'enseignement secondaire clavsique (lettres philosophie), and the certificate of studies in chemical and natural physics. No concession is now made to foreigners in virtue of any medical degree or distinctions they may possess, other than French.

For an honorary degree of M.D. of Paris, which does not carry with it the right to practice in France, considerable concessions are made. Comparatively few foreigners, however, have taken advantage of this degree.

The Medical Session in Paris lasts from November 3rd to July 31st, with one week's vacation at the New Year and a fortnight at Easter.

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In the Summer special classes are usually organised, and are announced in the medical journals.

Entrance to Lectures is free, with the exception of those few courses that the Council of the Faculty may have reserved to students. Foreign physicians are, as a rule, admitted to any clinic or lecture, but they may obtain an entrance card from the Secretary of the Faculty. This card is provided gratis. A similar card for the hospitals may be obtained at the Secretary's office of the Assistance Publique, 3, Avenue Victoria. These tickets are seldom required, a physician's visiting card being, as a rule, sufficient passport.

PRIVATE NURSING INSTITUTIONS.

Neither in hospital nor in private practice in France has professional nursing reached the standard that it enjoys in England and America. In recent years, however, determined efforts have been made in this direction, and there are now in Paris many institutes from which nurses, male and female, may be obtained. Such are—The Infirmiers de la Charité, 6, rue Oudinot; the Société Générale des Garde-malades de Paris, 45, rue du Bac; at 51, rue de Provence, etc.

There are also a number of English-trained nurses who work in Paris, and who are largely employed not only by the English and American physicians in practice there, but also by the best French practitioners. Many of them work independently, and their addresses may be obtained from any doctor. Others work together on the co-operative principle. Among the nursing institutions in Paris are:—
